

We are therefore planning a number of events which will take place during the week beginning 17<sup>th</sup> March and will coincide with parents' evening and other planned events. At parents' evenings, we will host a sale of used books (both adults and children), giving you an opportunity to donate books you no longer want or need and buy others (see below). We are also pleased to welcome back *'The Pop Project'* musicians, who this year will present the children with a show of music related to children's literature. **On this day, Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> March, we invite all children to come to school dressed as a book character. This is optional and should not involve you going out and buying expensive costumes.**

## CITV NATIONAL WRITING COMPETITION CLOSING DATE : FRIDAY 2<sup>nd</sup> MAY 2014



We would like to let everyone know of CITV's national writing 'Share a Story' competition which opens on 20<sup>th</sup> March and closes on 2<sup>nd</sup> May. The competition is an opportunity for your child to 'show off' their creative writing by submitting a short story. Last year, one of our pupils, Jay Jackson, was one of two national winners in his age group for his story 'The Grumpy Pizza' which told of a Pizza's clever way of making money by renting out space in his oven to other foods. As a prize-winner, Jay was invited to spend a day at CITV and had his story turned into an animation which was shown on the CITV channel. CITV also visited the school. We have sent home a leaflet from CITV about the competition. More information, including the animation of Jay's story, is available on the CITV website. As Year 5 noted in their assembly on Friday, everyone in school has the potential to be an author. We know we have many good story writers in school and want to encourage children to take part. You never know, we may have another national winner in our midst.

### YEAR 6 VISIT TO MACCLESFIELD FOREST

Last week, Year 6 visited Macclesfield Forest to take part in an outdoor arts adventure linked to our current arts theme, *Art in the Environment*. The main purpose was to build 3D art works in the style of famous sculpture Andy Goldsworthy. We had to work in small groups to gather natural objects from the forest, such as sticks, moss, leaves, stones and pine cones. Our guides, Frances and Clare, did a nature walk with us and we did lots of activities, such as matching colours in the forest with the colour on our 'rainbow chip.' We learned that there were lots of different colours in the forest, about the differences between towns and the countryside, and about the art work of Andy Goldsworthy who uses natural materials from the environment in his art work. At the end of the day, we had all created a 3D sculpture made from forest items, all held together by mother nature.

## CHILD and ROAD SAFETY

We would like to make all parents aware that school expects parents of all of our younger children (ages 3 – 7) to walk their children to the playground each morning. We are aware that some of our younger children are being left at the roadside and asked to make their own way into school which may not be entirely safe. Older brothers and sisters can accompany their younger siblings to the playground.

We have also been concerned lately about reports that some parents are leaving their much younger children (toddlers) unaccompanied in their cars while bringing their older children into school. There are several issues here, first and foremost being the risk to the children's safety from a wide range of potential dangers. Children of this age are not able to take care of themselves and should not be left at any time, even if it is for a few minutes. Anything, as you can imagine, has the potential to happen in that time. Whilst the law with regard to this is a grey area, it would be classed as neglect or abandonment should the child be found to be left at risk. Please do not leave your children in your car whilst you pop into school. Thank you.



Finally, we insist that all children who bring a bicycle to school, particularly our older children who use the roads, wear a **safety helmet**. We enable all children in Years 5 and 6 to complete the Bikeability course which promotes bicycle and road safety. There is little point in children doing this course if they then ignore the basic safety rules they have been taught. Any child who does not wear a safety helmet when using their bicycle for school must NOT bring their bicycle to school. Thank you for your support.

## SWIMMING GALA / SPORTS COMPETITIONS

We would like to congratulate all those children who participated in the swimming gala which took place just before the half-term holiday. The team represented our school very well indeed. This is one of many sports competitions that we are hoping to arrange in the coming months. The Government has given all schools additional funding to encourage more children to be active and take part in competitive sports. This funding has recently been extended until 2020!



## ATTENDANCE

Although there was a 'dip' in attendance just before half-term due to a lot of illness, our attendance is still above target at 97.2%. All classes are achieving 97% with the exception of our reception class at this time. Attendance for the past few weeks is as follows:
