Class 6's Country Adventures

Collect:

Fallen leaves, sticks, pine cones.

One leaf per group (supplement with photographs and drawings).

Don't Collect:

Unusual and uncommon plants.
Whole plant pulled out of the ground.
Wild flowers.

Remember:

Some mushrooms and other fungi are poisonous - never pick them.

Don't trample on plants, disturb animals or habitats while taking photos.

When on expeditions, always stay with your group or partner.
