## VICTORY GARDENS



During World War 2, a garden was a useful thing to have. Because of rationing, food was in short supply. Flowers grown for decoration were replaced by vegetables that could provide extra food for the family.
Your job is to draw up an aerial plan of your Victory Garden. Think about how much relative space each would need. You have to dig up the grass and make your garden do some work! Your garden is 20 cm by 30 cm on your paper. Remember you are looking down on your plan. Each area must be labelled very clearly. You must have paths between all the different areas in your garden.
In the garden you will need to think of the relative size of the following items.
